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The Price of the Lamb

As believers, Jesus is everything to us. He is the reason we are able to be born again. He is the King of kings and Lord of lords. There are many more incredible names and definitions of Jesus in the scripture, but there is one which was the first and most essential for us to know Him as.

God didn't strike the devil with a billion angels in great warfare to win you to salvation, but instead, He sent one perfect, pure, and innocent Lamb to be slaughtered in your place. You were not captured by power but bought with the great price of the blood of the Lamb of God.

Romans 6:4-5 helps us to see the importance of the Lamb. It says in 1 Peter 1:18-21, "knowing that you were not redeemed with corruptible things, like silver or gold, from your aimless conduct received by tradition from your fathers, but with the precious blood of Christ, as of a lamb without blemish and without spot. He indeed was foreordained before the foundation of the world, but was manifest in these last times for you who through Him believe in God, who raised Him from the dead and gave Him glory, so that your faith and hope are in God."

There is a call from the Spirit to the church, asking us to stop waiting until heaven comes.
